The Basics of Copyright Law

- Copyright Act 1968 (Cth)
- Federal legislation
- Grants creators of 'creative works' a bundle of exclusive rights
 - Perform
 - Publish
 - Reproduce
 - Communicate
 - Adapt
- No registration required
- Sets out duration of protection exceptions, parts VA and VB, infringement, remedies, royalty collection

Tertiary Music Licensing

- APRA AMCOS ARIA PPCA Tertiary Music Licence
- All 39 Universities Australia universities
- Various independent tertiary providers
- Musical work and sound recording rights













	Musical Work	Sound Recording
Performance	APRA	PPCA
Reproduction	AMCOS	ARIA













Covered Performances

- Performance in class by a teacher or student – s 28 of the Act
- Performance as part of an assessment (i.e. a jury exam) s 28/licence
- Public performance at free events











Covered Performances

- University performances on or off campus
- Use of music in admin, staff and student areas
- Music on telephone hold system











Other Performance Licensing

- Performance where admission is charged (Casual Event Licence)
- Performance by a third party hiring a venue (Casual Event Licence)
- Dramatic Context Performance (Dramatic Context Licensing)
- Grand Right Work (Publisher Permissions)
- Student run music groups (Community Music Groups Licence)











Audio Reproduction

- Copying legally purchased recordings (digital or physical)
- Making 'cover' recording (also see s 200 of the Act for assessment purposes)
- Any format
- University server, password protected intranet i.e. BlackBoard
- Lent out as a burnt physical copy
- Streaming or download purposes











Audio-Visual Reproduction

- Making AV presentations (i.e. PowerPoint)
- Using music in video lectures (on intranet only)/videoing lectures containing music
- Videoing student/staff/university performances and events
- University server, password protected intranet i.e. BlackBoard
- Streaming or download purposes











Copies of Recordings

- No limit on number of copies
- Staff, students, university community only
- Physical reproduction (CD, DVD, USB)
- Digital reproduction (download or stream over server/intranet only)











Copying Clause

This recording has been made by the [] University under the express terms of an educational licence between it, AMCOS and ARIA and may only be used as authorised by [] University pursuant to the terms of that licence; and

- (i) the title of each musical work;
- (ii) the name of each composer, lyricist and arranger; and
- (iii) if the recording contains an ARIA Sound Recording, the artist/group name and the name of the record company or record label.











What's not covered...

- Streaming or download of audio or audio-visual on the internet
- Selling for more than cost recovery purposes (i.e. selling for profit)
- Making recordings available to the public
- Using infringing originals











Sheet Music Reproduction

- Not covered under the Tertiary Music Licence.
- Reliance on the exceptions in the Act and the Copyright Agency Statutory Licence – Part VB
- S 200 reproduction for use as an answer or question in an exam
- S 200AB flexible dealing (not otherwise covered, not available for purchase, educational, reasonable use)
- S 40 personal research and study (reasonable portion (10%))
- S 41 criticism and review (reasonable portion)











Part VB Statutory Licence

 Remember, students are bound to different rules than staff

- Administered by Copyright Agency
- 10% or one chapter, whichever is greater
- Sheet music = 10% of the number of bars













Types of Copying

- Physical =
 - Photocopying
 - Scanning
- Digital (with Electronic Use Notice included) =
 - Saving to disk
 - Printing
 - Making available online
 - Emailing













Physical & Digital Copying

- To copy more than a reasonable portion a work must be:
 - Unpublished
 - Not separately available within a reasonable time at a reasonable price
 - An article in a periodical (more than one from a periodical if they're on the same topic)











Digital Only Copying

- To copy more than a reasonable portion a work must be (further to the allowances in the previous slide):
 - Unavailable for purchase in a digital format
- Otherwise it's 10% of the number of bars
- Always read the terms and conditions of the content provider
